During the month of October 2023, Immanuel celebrated 125 years of ministry. In 2002 as we were beginning our first strategic planning process, I had the pleasure and challenge to put together an afternoon presentation to share with members of Immanuel a little glimpse at the history of Immanuel. I poured through some of the old scrapbooks, read information written by others, and even read some of the minutes from meetings of the early church. In addition, some of our confirmands interviewed some of the members of Immanuel about their memories. Many of those videos are included here. Through it all, what always struck me was how generous the members of Immanuel have been over the years and how they prepared for the future, maybe not even knowing they were doing it. What they did back then has had an impact on the kind of church family we are today. I am thankful to be a part of the ministry here at immanuel and share some of these stories of generosity.

This presentation was shared during worship on September 24, 2023 to kick off our 125 celebration. It included scripture, pictures, stories, videos, prayers and songs.

ev A.E. Gustafson

On October 20, 1898, Mr and Mrs John Berglin generously opened their home to the organizational meeting to begin a Swedish congregation. Thirteen people were present and eleven others signed the first charter. The Rev. A. E. Gustafson of Helena presided at this meeting and the infant church was called The Swedish Evangelical Emanuel Congregation.



Over the next two years, members generously opened their homes for the infant congregation to meet only monthly since there was no church available to them. They did try to buy a building, but no purchase was made.



On January 22, 1900, Pastor Gustafson announced his resignation. Sufficient progress had not been made to continue the work and nothing more was attempted in five years.

1905- Reorganized

- Pastor Herman Lind of Anaconda presiding
- Petitioned Augustana Synod for membership
- Built the first church on Alder Street



In February 1905, a student, H.F. Johnson, presided at the services and Rev. Herman Lind from Anaconda was called to reorganize the congregation. Members petitioned the Augustana Synod for membership and became a part of the church at large. A church building was built on Alder street. Several pastors served over the next 20 years.

In August 1919, Pastor E.A. Palm came to Immanuel. It was in that year that the confirmation class was taught in the English language and many services were conducted in English. Over the next 25 years, changes were made to the building and several more pastors served Immanuel.

In those early years on Alder street, members generously gave of their time to keep the church going. Members would come early to get the fire going in the furnace to warm up the building. Families took turns cleaning the building and assisting with worship.

THE LADIES AID

The Ladies Aid was an organized group of women who, according to lifetime member, Gordon Swanson (grandson of one of the charter members), ran the church.



TEACHING



Throughout the years members have generously shared their time to **TEACH**. Photos in our history share teachers teaching Sunday School on Alder street and at the "New Church" on South Avenue. In 2017, Sunday School evolved into our Family Faith Gatherings where families meet and learn together.



Women's groups have met throughout the years. In the early years they were called Ladies' Aid groups and then Circles. The Naomi Circle still meets monthly.

Men have also had their Bible studies throughout the years.


During Covid in 2020 Christian Education adapted into Book studies on Zoom.



CAMP IMLU




Between 1952 and 1999, Time was also generously given to support the church owned **Camp Imlu-** a camp on the Clearwater River. Over the years, members gave of their time to build the lodge and the dormitory.



It was a place where retreats were held for youth, adults, and families and many connections were made over meals and recreation. Sadly, In 1996 the State of Montana increased the cost of the lease dramatically, eventually with the cost of the lease out of reach. In 1999, Camp Imlu was sold with the proceeds going to start the Immanuel Endowment Fund.

SMORGASBORDS

Smorgasbords have been a community event even as far back as the 1930's.





Beginning again in the 1980's, the church Lutefisk, Lefse and Meatball Dinners or **Smorgasbords** involved the time to raise funds to support Camp Imlu and other Outreach efforts in our community. Friends of Immanuel generously gave of their time preparing cookies, lefse, and 200 pounds of meatballs, to peel potatoes, and serve up to 300-400 people. It included lots of time and fellowship with others.

QUILTERS



Over the years, **QUILTERS** have generously shared their time. In the 70's and 80's the Ruth Unit made and sold quilts and donated the proceeds to Lutheran World Relief and the Poverello Center. They also made quilts for the beds at the Poverello when it opened its doors on Ryman in the early 80's. Since the late 1990's quilters at Immanuel have provided quilts for families who receive gifts, groceries and individual quilts for our Giving Tree at Christmas time.

his righteousness endures forever."



REFLECTIONS

SUPPORT FOR THE CHURCH BUILDING

IMMANUEL has a long history of generosity of sharing their treasures- financial resources to support the church building!

A great example was the 1933 minutes of the council meeting that shared this quote. "The bills this month amounted to more than we have in the treasury. So a motion was made and seconded that Rev Johnson ask the girls club and ladies aid to make up the difference."

A week later a special council meeting was held with this in the minutes "Reverend Johnson told the council that one of our church members wishes to build and pay all expenses to erect a new front entrance on the church. They talked over this proposition and decided to let it be done."

Through the years, the church on Alder financial support was found to make many improvements. By 1943, the church was valued at \$15,000. It included a spacious chapel for worship with a two manual Reuter pipe organ.





It also had a large and beautifully furnished parish hall, with one of the most modern and up to date kitchens in the city and a basement for Sunday School and Luther League activities.

THE NEW CHURCH

As the church grew by 1953 it had a membership of 260 with <u>150</u> children. The church council decided it was time to build a new church. The focus was on the children. A quote from the campaign book said. "We need a larger sanctuary and most of all we need a modern and well-equipped church school for our children. It is hard to teach a child to worship God in the beauty of holiness in an unattractive room.

Our church basement was not planned for use in a modern program of Christian education and cannot be adapted to furnish the facilities that are needed. As our friends and members entrust to us their most precious possession—their children—we should be concerned that our Church offers the very best within our power and means."








The funds came through for the \$120,000 building. Groundbreaking was in the fall of 1954, the cornerstone was laid the following spring in 1955 and the sanctuary with classrooms in the basement was dedicated in September of 1955! (There must not have been a lot of permits needed!)

Ground was broken for the Education wing in 1958. The Daily Missoulian reported: "Immanuel Lutheran Church Sunday School children broke ground Sunday for an education building to be added to the church. For the ceremony, the children of the church stood on a chalk outline of the new building, on which work will begin Monday. "Do you think

ACCESSIBILITY

When the building was built in 1955, the focus was on children- all who could easily go up and down stairs, but as time went on accessibility became the more of a focus. In 1984, Immanuel was remembered in the will of the Hemgrens who left \$33,000 for a permanent memorial. The Hemgren Addition was added that included an accessible

entrance, a handicap-accessible bathroom and a meeting room we call the Hemgren Room) at the sanctuary level.



Members have always taken great pride in the upkeep for the building- Financial support has been available to repair the roof, replace the furnace and general upkeep of the building.

As some of our members grew older and less mobile, the dream of an elevator and better accessibility was a goal for every strategic plan beginning in 2001. From 2011- 2018, the Accessibility Team met and planned and the generosity of the congregation helped to fund some many ways to make Immanuel more accessible. 







ARTISTS





In 2001, Phyllis Huber was hired as Worship & Music, Christian Ed and Youth and Family Director. Under Phyllis' leadership, worship evolved into Five Different Worship Bands including a Youth Band and a Men's Group called the Fifth Sunday.

Following Phyllis' vision, Phil Johnston and Liz Hollers continued to lead two services, a contemporary Spirit Alive! worship and a traditional worship. Liz Hollers also composed music and liturgy pieces for Immanuel.





Allen Sasser-Goehner continued to lead the two worships until the the Covid Pandemic of 2020-2022, alongside culture shifts around church, led to Immanuel offering one "blended" worship.

Generations of Generosity – Hospitality



In 1968, when Immanuel was celebrating 70 years of ministry, Pastor Rod Johnson shared this in an article in the Daily Missoulian "The history of the Protestant churches in the New world is one of frontier situations. When the church came to many communities, it often provided the only place where immigrants who did not yet speak English could communicate



building institutions and in some instances the church was the only organization that existed in the community. But today we are becoming more involved in attempting to influence those institutions that exist in society outside the church."

OUTREACH

During the 60's and early 70's Immanuel began to reach out to our community to make a difference - with time, talents and treasure.



One amazing story was one shared by Connie Lindborg in 2002. She shared a story of how Immanuel had \$3000 to give as seed money and Connie was put in charge.

Look at what \$3000 did to get these very important organizations off the ground. Today... Council Groves low income housing still exists and serves Missoula. The Youth Guidance Homes are Youth Homes and serve 200 children and youth each day from age 2 to 18. It is based out of Missoula, but has local operations in Polson, Kalispell, Hamilton and Helena. And Goodwill Industries continues to serve Missoula



Many more examples of hospitality exist in our history. In the early 1960's Immanuel housed one of the first kindergarten classes in Missoula. For the past 40 years, we have hosted Immanuel's pre-school with certified teachers preparing children for kindergarten.

In 1975, Immanuel along with four other Lutheran churches sponsored a total of 38 Vietnamese and Laotian refugees.

In addition, Immanuel has been involved with Habitat for Humanity since 2002.

We have been one of the host congregations for Family Promise of Missoula since 2012. Immanuel was instrumental in 2018 in assisting with building the Meadowlark to house the Family Housing Center to provide shelter and services for families experiencing homelessness.



In 2017, Immanuel began a collaboration with Washington Middle School focusing on at-risk youth. This resulted in Immanuel volunteers planning and leading an after-school Flagship program, "Cooking and Crafting" and two Flagship week-long summer camps.

Generosity from Immanuel goes beyond Missoula. We are a strong supporter and active in participating at Flathead Lutheran Bible Camp. The generosity of Immanuel and its members made the accessible Lakeview Complex possible as well as building the new dock with the accessible lift.





We are a leading congregation in Montana Synod for giving Mission support, which in turnSupport other ministries in Montana, the nation and the World. We continue to work and give gifts through Lutheran World Relief, ELCA World Hunger and Lutheran Disaster Response. This year the Marks Apple Days will go to provide orchards through ELCA Good Gifts to third world countries.

Most recently our hospitality has extended by becoming a Reconciling in Christ Congregation- to ensure the welcome, inclusion, celebration, and advocacy for people of all sexual orientations, gender identities, and gender expressions; work for racial equity and commit to anti-racist work and support the national program. Our welcome statement hangs in our sanctuary and we practice our mission to "Share the Love of Christ with All!"
