What is Reformation Sunday?



Each year, in October, we celebrate the Protestant Reformation, a movement that brought the church's focus back to God's free gift of salvation in Jesus Christ.

Martin Luther was a 16th-century German monk, priest, professor, and prolific writer. He is one of

the most significant figures in Christian history. On October 31, 1517, he posted his 95 Theses on the door of the Castle Church in Wittenburg. It addressed abuses of the Catholic church, the Pope and the selling of indulgences. His beliefs helped birth the Reformation, which would give rise to Protestantism. Luther was not perfect. Luther expressed antagonistic, violent views towards Jews; these views have been confessed, rejected, renounced and refuted by the ELCA.

Martin Luther and the reformers proclaimed that a sinner (that is everyone) is justified (made right) before God by GRACE ALONE through FAITH ALONE for the sake of CHRIST ALONE, a truth revealed to us in SCRIPTURE ALONE. Luther taught that salvation and, consequently, eternal life are not earned by good deeds, but are received only as the free gift of God's grace through the believer's faith in Jesus Christ as Redeemer from sin.

Though rooted in the past, we celebrate the Reformation today because the church must always be reformed in order to live out the love of Christ in an ever-changing world. We celebrate the good news of God's grace, that Jesus Christ sets us free every day to do this life-transforming work. Trusting in the freedom given to us in baptism, we pray for the church, that Christians will unite more fully in worship and mission.
